Vision, Aims and Values of our Schools

'Grace is a gift from God.' (Ephesians 2:8)

Our school federations distinct Christian Vision permeates all aspects of school life and underpins all that we do. The heart of this vision is our commitment to serve with *Grace*, giving our very best in all we do, providing a broad, balanced and inclusive curriculum which allows our pupils to flourish. This vision is supported by the values we teach, the Christian Values chosen by children, parents, staff, governors and our local community. Values of:

Respect Love Friendship Truthfulness Courage Perseverance

Our school federation aims to provide the best quality education possible in a stimulating environment where children feel happy and safe. With our Christian Vision and Values forming the foundation of our ethos, we offer a caring and tolerant atmosphere for learning where cultural diversity is valued.

We aim is for every individual to recognise that they are loved unconditionally by God and because of this they can flourish.

At Tibberton and Hindlip C of E First School, Collective Worship is central to the life of our school and reflects our Christian vision of grace. As small Church of England First Schools, we seek to create a nurturing and loving community where every child is known, valued and encouraged to flourish. We believe that all members of our school community are unconditionally loved by God and should be treated with dignity, compassion and respect.

This policy has been developed in line with guidance from the Diocese of Worcester and reflects the distinctive Christian character of our school. It has been adapted to meet the unique context and needs of our school community.

Legal Framework

There must be a daily act of Collective Worship in all maintained schools for all pupils, other than those in a nursery class or a nursery school. This can take place at any time in the school day and in any groupings. Collective Worship in a Church of England school must be in accordance with the tenants and practices of the Church of England. In other words, the law on Collective Worship that applies in a community school, "that it should be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character", is not relevant. Worship in Tibberton and Hindlip C of E Schools should be distinctly Christian and reflect Anglican traditions.

School Statement on Collective Worship

In Tibberton & Hindlip CE First Schools worship is central to the life of school and is the main platform for exploring the school's vision.

Our daily collective worship is far more than just a fulfilment of statutory requirement. It is the beating heartbeat of school life. It provides an opportunity for the whole school to share individual successes and to reaffirm our commitment to our accepted ethos and to praise and thank God together. We like to set the scene with the children entering the room quietly to music. A formal greeting starts the assembly. The lighting of three candles to signify the Holy Trinity is used to mark the beginning of our prayers and quiet reflection. A cross is situated in our focus area. Other visual aids and Anglican symbols may also be used including coloured cloths for the assembly table that are changed according to the church season and an Advent Crown. For safety reasons children are not involved in lighting the candle, although monitors are responsible for organising the music and setting out the cross and candle on our focus table. We may also refer to symbols from other faiths where relevant.

We have an agreed structure to our Collective Worship, which reflects liturgical Anglican worship:

1. *GATHERING - We join together with a welcome greeting*
2. *ENGAGING - We explore the theme for our Collective Worship*
3. *REFLECTING - time to silently reflect, think, pray, sing*
4. *SENDING OUT - this is where the inspirational nature hits - what have you learnt, we have heard etc. now go and live it!*

It is well planned and of high quality so that the whole school community is engaged on a journey of discovery, exploring the teachings of Jesus and the Bible.

For Christians in church, worship is about honouring God and responding to the loving nature of God as revealed through the Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. A school is not a church but is a collection of people who come from a variety of backgrounds for the purpose of education. The family backgrounds may be very different and Collective Worship must take account of the varied circumstances of staff and pupils.

However, in Tibberton & Hindlip CE First Schools the purpose of Collective Worship will be to lead people to a threshold where they can witness worship and join in, if they wish.

Through Collective Worship, pupils will be offered a space and a place for the telling of the Christian story. They will be offered an understanding of worship through being invited to participate in or observe prayer, reading and reflection on the Bible, liturgy, sacrament and experience of the musical and other imaginative riches of Christianity. Opportunities to reflect on the beauty, joy and pain of the world will be given. Pupils will be given time to consider their responsibilities to others and to grow in love and service. Time will be given for celebration, both for the accomplishments of school members and to mark the seasonal festivals of the Christian calendar and those of other faiths. Pupils will be offered time to be able to contemplate and develop spiritually. Collective Worship in our school is invitational, inspirational and inclusive.

Aims and Guiding Principles

Collective Worship is pivotal to the life of the school and as such. It encompasses all that we do and supports the outworking of our school vision. Therefore, at its heart, Collective Worship at Tibberton & Hindlip CE First Schools strives to follow the following principles:

- **It is invitational**

Acts of Collective Worship will:

- nurture and maintain the dignity of the image of God in everyone through working for social justice;
- encourage pupils to consider the needs of others through charitable service and courageous advocacy;
- nurture reflection, stillness, meditation and prayer;
- provide pupils with (age appropriate) opportunities to explore the spiritual dimension of their lives through music, images and words;
- provide a sense of occasion that is separate from the rest of the school day;
- foster an appreciation of the natural world and our shared responsibilities for maintaining it;
- identify opportunities for Christian celebration which can be associated with other school events;
- develop clear partnerships between worship in the school and the wider community.

- **It is inclusive**

Our understanding of Christianity is that it is an inclusive faith which mirrors the attitude of Jesus Christ in the Gospels. Thus, we welcome children and staff of all faiths to our worship. Through their Christian character our acts of Collective Worship will:

- recognise and celebrate the diversity of cultures, lifestyles and faiths which exist in our school and local community;
- have an atmosphere in which everyone feels valued and safe;
- be appropriate for every student to attend;
- use language that is accessible and does not assume a particular faith of the listener;
- account for the different spiritual journeys that children and adults are on;
- focus on issues and experiences which are relevant to the pupils;
- give space to consent and dissent, to sit back and consider;
- foster active roles of pupils, parents and members of the local community – in preparation, participation and leadership;
- provide a variety of different opportunities for reflection, understanding of diverse liturgical traditions, participation, challenge and enjoyment where all present can be actively involved and develop their own spirituality whilst contributing to the communal journey.

- **It is inspiring**

Our acts of collective worship provide wider opportunities to:

- promote wide ownership of our Christian vision;
- assist learners to have increased awareness and to reflect upon fundamental issues about life;
- allow children and adults to ask big questions about life and beyond;
- become courageous advocates in the world in which they live;
- motivate children into action, thinking different and reflecting on their behaviour, action and wider community;
- develop learners' understanding of the Christian faith and Church (Anglican) practice through appropriate Biblical and liturgical content, including sharing the Eucharist;
- encounter and explore Jesus's teachings and the trinitarian nature of Christian faith;
- provide an experience of worship that will offer opportunities for those present to observe and / or respond to the presence, power and peace of God as understood by Christians. This will always be invitational, offering an opportunity to take part whilst allowing the freedom for those of other faiths and none to be present with integrity;
- include appropriate references to and elements of other faiths and secular worldviews;
- include opportunities to celebrate the academic, social, personal and wider achievements of pupils.

- **Therefore, we will ensure that:**

- a range of people are involved in leading worship, including learners;
- opportunities are offered to all children and staff to develop their skills in planning, leading and evaluating the impact of school worship with the support and shared engagement of the local church community. Pupils will be at the centre of this process taking on increasingly independent roles in planning and leading worship;
- the timetabling of acts of worship includes the use of the local church and various groupings of pupils;
- worship is planned in relation to our distinctive Christian vision and associate values;
- worship is regularly evaluated by a range of members of the school community;
- materials and themes for worship are carefully selected to ensure that children have clear understanding of how the teachings of Jesus impact what we do locally, nationally and globally
- opportunities for worship / prayer are offered throughout the day.

Pattern of Collective Worship

Our regular pattern of worship ensures that children experience worship from a range a different leaders and viewpoints, whilst maintaining the integrity of Anglican Liturgy.

Planning, Recording, Monitoring and Evaluation

Planning

- Collective worship is planned from a variety of sources, including Imaginor resources, to cover our core Christian Values. Each half term will focus on a particular value. Special days, special people and festivals from other religions form part of the Collective Worship programme. Each assembly usually includes a story with a message or moral, a chance for children to participate, a thought to share and reflect upon, prayers, and a hymn. Children may lead our prayers, singing or whole assembly. We have also mapped our high-quality texts to use in Collective Worship across the school year which reflect our Christian Values.
 - A termly overview for worship is planned each term in conjunction with SLT, Collective Worship Leader and local clergy.
 - Worship planning follows the Church calendar and reflects key Christian festivals, seasons and the calendars of other faiths.
 - A clear liturgy is followed for each act of Collective Worship.
 - For each act of Collective Worship, a Bible reading, song and prayer are carefully planned to link with the theme of worship.
 - Time for stillness, reflection and spiritual reflection is carefully planned within worship.
- **Monitoring and Evaluation** (*amend according to own practices*)
 - The effectiveness of Collective Worship is monitored within our regular monitoring cycle.
 - Collective Worship is monitored by the Senior Leadership Team, Collective Worship Lead, Governors and Worship leaders to ensure that Collective Worship remains invitational, inclusive and inspiring.
 - Monitoring for Collective Worship is kept by the Collective Worship Lead and the Headteacher.

- At the end of each term we evaluate the successes of Collective Worship with the pupils to then make improvements for the next term.

Roles and Responsibilities

The Governing Body should:

- provide a statement within the school prospectus which makes clear that the aims of Collective Worship within the school are based on its Christian foundation and includes parents' legal right to withdraw their children from the act of worship;
- ensure that the school fulfills its legal responsibility for Collective Worship;
- in conjunction with the Headteacher, monitor the effectiveness of Collective Worship within the school and make recommendations for its development in accordance with the SIAMS Schedule.

Headteacher / Collective Worship Lead should:

- co-ordinate timetabling / themes **across a two-year rolling program**, into long, medium and short-term planning, in conjunction with the school and church community;
- ensure that the school prospectus, welcome / induction pack and website have clear statements about the school's ethos for Collective Worship, (including the right of withdrawal);
- ensure that there is a balance of regular and one-off visitors during the year, and being a point of contact for those visitors so that they understand their contribution to the worship life of the school;
- organise the evaluation of Collective Worship;
- be a part of the SIAMS inspection process;
- support other members of staff;
- know where to go for good resources to support worship;
- lead staff meetings that have a focus on Collective Worship;
- be responsible for leading school worship teams, or prayer & reflection spaces.

Pupil Worship Team (CREW) should:

- plan and lead Collective Worship;
- suggest new ideas for Collective Worship;
- promoting Collective Worship within the school.

Staff should:

- support the crucial role that Collective Worship plays within the school;
- plan and lead Collective Worship when required;
- provide opportunities for pupils to reflect on worship at other times during the week.

Staff Development and Training

We ensure that all staff, including support staff, receive appropriate training and opportunities for professional development, both as individuals and as groups or teams. This support is provided by Diocese of Worcester Education Team. Training needs for staff may be identified through regular subject leader audits as well as performance management cycles. Additionally, support and guidance are provided for visitors and the clergy who lead Collective Worship.

The Right of Withdrawal from Collective Worship

The 1944 and 1988 Education Acts state that parents have the right to withdraw children from Collective Worship and suitable arrangements should be made to accommodate these children.

In Tibberton & Hindlip CE First Schools there are significant numbers of children whose families are members of another faith, or who hold a non-religious world view.

On occasion, a parent may make a request for their child to be withdrawn from Collective Worship. If the parent asks that a pupil should be wholly or partly excused from attending any religious worship at the school, then the school must comply (*this means that a parent may, for example, request their child does not take part in a carol service when otherwise the child takes part in daily Collective Worship.*)

Parents may be offered the opportunity to discuss their request with the headteacher; however, parents are under no obligation to take up the offer of a discussion. The refusal of a parent to discuss their reasons with the head teacher must not impact on the decision of the headteacher to grant the request for referral.

Where parents have withdrawn their children from Collective Worship and request religious worship according to their faith or denomination, the governors and Headteacher will seek to respond positively to such requests providing:

- such arrangements can be made at no additional cost to the school;
- that the alternative provision would be consistent with the overall purposes of the school curriculum as set out in the Education Acts.

Review

This policy will be subject to the normal cycle of policy review and will be reviewed and ratified by the Governing Body every year. Furthermore, there may be occasions where this policy is reviewed outside the normal review cycle, including but not limited to:

- a change in the SIAMS Schedule for Inspections;
- a change in legal position framework for Collective Worship.
